New Orleans's own Astral Project

Monday March 27, 8PM

An outstanding New Orleans jazz group, known as the **Astral Project**, will be at the afterthought in Little Rock on Monday March 27, 8 PM, tickets \$10.

Astral Project is considered by many to be the best working band in their hometown. They've played together since 1978, and have been around for a number of Jazz and Heritage festivals, playing a brand of jazz that's cohesive and creative. Astral Project was the first group that Bobby McFerrin ever sang with. They're one of New Orleans' favorite bands, and a band that, according to Down Beat magazine is "one of the most distinctive and cohesive quintets in jazz of the 90's."

JazzTimes proclaimed Astral Project as "one of the more adventurous working units in modern jazz today." They describe the players on the CD VooDooBop in exemplary terms: "An undulating, syncopated groove by drummer Johnny Vidacovich ... authoritative, thumping upright basslines of James Singleton. ... strategically placed chordal voicings by pianist David

The Heath Brothers, three Philadelphia-born jazz artists with more than 150 years experience between them, will be in concert with Sir Roland Hanna, a pianist and composer with more than 50 albums to his credit, Thursday, March 30, 7 PM at the Arkansas Arts Center, 10th and Commerce Streets, Little Rock. Tickets, \$15 for Arts Center members and \$20 for nonmembers, may be reserved by calling (501) 372-4000.

Brought to the Arts Center by Cypress jazz Associates, the Heath Brothers and Sir Roland Hanna have played individually with such top names in jazz as Charlie Parker, J. J. Johnson, Dizzy Gillespie, Miles Davis, John Coltrane, Thelonius Monk, Dexter Gordon, The Crusaders, Sarah Vaughn, Carmen McRae, Al Hibler, and Benny Goodman.

Percy Heath, 77, bassist; Jimmy Heath, 73, writer, arraigner and sax player, and Albert "Tootie" Heath, 65, drummer, pick and choose their venues these days. Although they primarily perform as solo artists, they have joined and recorded such titles as the Heath

True to the original spirit of jazz, Astral Project creates real tunes memorable melodies — while giving the musicians freedom to incorporate influences from all sources. Like a flock of birds in flight, the group shifts direction with an ease so uncanny it seems to verge on telepathy. It's an ease that can come only from special individuals who have spent 20 years improvising together. "If I close my eyes," says James Singleton, "I can learn more, I get more. You find it's a transcendent experience. It's a spiritual experience in a way. Because you find you become part of a larger thing. It reinforces your faith - in God and existence, human existence. It heals you."

Astral Project will play at the AfterThought on Monday March 27, 2000, at 8pm. Tickets are \$10, available in advance at the Afterthought (663-1196) or Capitol Keyboard (228-9999).

Joe Milligan is currently a student at UALR studying guitar under Mike Carenbauer. He plays with the UALR Jazz combo, studio 101, and the guitar ensemble. Professionally he plays with the Stardust Jazz Orchestra witch is based out of Hot Springs and performs regularly at the Arlington Hotel. Joe was born and raised in North Little Rock, Arkansas. Michael Murphy plays flute, saxophone, and keyboards. He graduated and later taught at Henderson State University. Michael says "I grew up with jazz. My father was a band director and saxophonist. We both used to play in the Style Masters." Michael's dad is none other than saxophonist David Murphy.

The Jazz Community Loses Two Jazz Legends



Charles Thomas

Charles Thomas, of the Memphis jazz school, passed away on Tuesday 23 November 1999 at 64 years of age. An extraordinary jazz pianist, he had played with greats around the world, and was touted as one of the best pianists in the South. Thomas was born in 1935 in Memphis, TN, where he grew up playing piano and organ in local churches. He was a classmate of Phineas Newborn. As an adult he studied and mastered the playing styles of Budd Powell, Thelonius Monk, and the compositional rhetoric of Duke Ellington. His mastery of the Oscar Peterson style has earned much acclaim. Thomas lived quietly, splitting his time between his job at the Holiday Inn in Little Rock and his hometown of Memphis. He was honored

at Memorial Jam Sessions at the Afterthought by local and out-of-town Little Rock musicians.

Ralph Porter died during the week of January 24, 2000. He was 87. He was a well known trumpet player and band leader in the era of Count Basie. He was born in Hot Springs and raised in Detroit, Michigan, where he learned to play trumpet. Porter had his own band in Arkansas in the 1930's, and later in 1935 he joined the Jeter-Piller territory band. He played with them for five years, ending in St. Louis where Porter met Fate Marable and joined his band playing on river boats between St. Louis and Pittsburgh. After this, he returned to Arkansas where he headed his own band and worked in clubs. He returned to Hot Springs and organized a dance band in 1933. A memorial jam session for Ralph Porter was held on Monday January 31.

Both were members of the Arkansas Jazz Hall of Fame and will be missed by the community. More information on these artists can be found at the AJHF web site, www.arjazz.org

Brothers/Jazz Family (1998) and the Heath Brothers As We were Saying (1997). Both CDs are available on the concord Records label. Sir Roland Hanna is featured on piano on the cut "As We Were Saying".

Hanna ranks among the major artist in jazz today, and is viewed as one of the most versatile pianist of any generation. After Graduating from high school in Michigan and spending time with the U.S. Army Band, he studied music at Eastman School of Music and The Julliard School. He is a prolific writer with more than 400 compositions to his credit and has recorded 50 albums. Most recent releases include Sir Roland Hanna: Duke Ellington Piano Solos (1991), Roland hanna Plays Gershwin (1993) and Sir Roland Hanna, Maybeck Recital hall Series Vol. 32 (1994). He is currently a professor at the Aaron Copland School of Music, Queens college, the City University of New York.
